What is Child Protection about?

All of the adults around you think that your health, safety and happiness are important.

In our school, we respect our children and help to protect their rights.

We do our best to help make good educational progress.

We teach children how to notice risks in different situations and how to protect themselves and stay safe in school and at home.

How will we try and protect children?

We try to make a safe environment for children to learn in.

We want to help ensure that children remain safe, at home as well as at school.

We think it is important for our children to know where to get help if they are worried or unhappy about something.

Don't keep a secret if someone:

- Is bullying you
- Is saying funny things to you that you do not like or upsets you.
- Touching you in places you know are wrong
- Trying to give you tablets, cigarettes, vapes, drugs or alcohol.
- Hitting you or hurting you.
- Sending unkind messages on the internet or on to your phone.

Need to talk?

If you need to talk, we will listen.

You can talk to any adult in our school, they are here to help and will listen to all of your worries.

Try to talk to someone you feel safe with.

What happens next?

Sometimes a member of staff will need to check things with Mrs Curtis, who is the school's Designated Safeguarding Person (DSP). If Mrs Curtis can help resolve the problem herself, she will do so.

If Mrs Curtis is not available then a member of staff can check things with Mrs McCormick.

Sometimes they may need to contact other people who support children and families.

Your teachers are here to support you and will explain all of this to you, you can always go and ask them questions if you are unsure of anything.
